

Exclusive trip: Trap-feeding Eden's whales of Thailand

12-21 September & 19-28 September 2025



Calling all serious whale-watchers! This very special trip has one specific objective - the chance to see and photograph one of the most extraordinary whale behaviours on the planet - Eden's whales trap-feeding.

About our trip

Little more than an hour away from the hustle and bustle of Bangkok, a secret and exciting wildlife experience awaits, completely off-grid from the Thai tourist trail. Few people know that the upper Gulf of Thailand is home not only to a resident group of Eden's whales (a sub-species of Bryde's whale – likely to be declared a new species in the not-too-distant future) but is also the setting for their extraordinary feeding behaviour, too. We have planned our trip in early autumn, the perfect time to watch this behaviour, when the whales hunt shoals of anchovies, their favourite food.

Eden's whales have a novel way to hunt – 'trap-feeding' – which was only documented in recent years. First, there is an eruption of water as the whale surfaces; then it slaps the water surface a few times with its tail, before hanging vertically, with its lower jaw dropped and humongous mouth wide open. Anchovies, keen to seek shelter to avoid all the tail-slapping commotion, unwittingly perceive the now-still whale to be safe and they shoal into its mouth. The whale can hang there, mouth agape with fish leaping in, for as little as 10 seconds or as long as many minutes. There is nowhere else on the planet you can witness Bryde's whales doing this. Heaving its mouth closed, as it rises up and traps hundreds of fish in a single gulp, the whale then slowly sinks back into the water.

White-winged, whiskered and common terns all add to the thrilling drama, circling, diving and feeding on the panicked anchovies (which sometimes also seek shelter on our boat, too, leaping onto the deck).

There is also a very good chance of seeing endangered Irrawaddy dolphins, a charismatic species that is on every keen whale watcher's wish-list. In fact, this is one of the best places to see them (they are usually shy of boats but are quite approachable in this corner of the Gulf of Thailand).

There are two other rarer cetacean species, too, which we hope see: finless porpoise and Indo-Pacific humpback dolphin.





Highlights

- Travel each day on an exclusively chartered boat, which was the first dedicated whale-watching operator to work in the area, promoting wildlife eco-tourism, with a very experienced crew.
- Small group of a maximum of 14, plus guides and crew. The boat can take up to 30 passengers but we have chosen to limit numbers so that there is lots of deck-space for observation and photography.
- Seven full-day whale-watching days (eight hours each day).
- Witness Bryde's whale behaviour rarely seen anywhere else on Earth.
- Good chance of seeing pods of Irrawaddy dolphins and other cetacean species.
- A unique trip that is not offered by any other wildlife operator.
- Waterfront accommodation each night at a comfortable and relaxing hotel, set among mangrove swamps.

- Guide services of Mark Carwardine and Rachel Ashton (Rachel will produce a slide show of the trip and give everyone a link to download it afterwards).

Itinerary

Day 1: Fly to Bangkok and transfer 75km southeast to the hotel which will be our home for the next 7 nights. Settle in and meet for supper and briefing from Mark and Rachel.

Days 2-7: The next week we will pack in as much whale watching as possible. We will be transferred each morning to the pier for breakfast and set off on our boat. We may encounter our first whales within a few minutes or couple of hours. Each evening we return to check our photos, relax and perhaps enjoy the sunset with a sundowner, and then meet for supper.

Day 8: This is our last full day at sea. We transfer afterwards to Bangkok airport for overnight stay in airport hotel.

Day 9: Fly home or extend your stay in Thailand.
